nearly £1 billion to construct in today's money. It then used to transmit the BBC World Service.

The building, even though it may be ugly, is in good condition and is capable of being used for activities which could create and sustain local employment.

The Cobra Mist site has however been flooded for nearly two years. Many will not realise that the flooding did not come about simply as a result of the tidal surge in December 2013, but because of the National Trust omitting to reinforce and then repair a short section of what is known as the "American Wall". This is about a mile and a half South of the Martello tower - on the National Trust's land.

The background is that in 1993 when the National Trust came to Orford they expressly agreed to prevent flooding of the Cobra Mist site, in addition to having the usual legal duties of care towards neighbours. Regrettably, once the MoD left, such duties were largely ignored. River walls were not maintained as before and a breach was deliberately made in 1998 in a section of the river wall in Upper Lantern Marshes closer to Aldeburgh. This was done without ensuring that the next line of defence - the American Wall - would be sufficient as a flood defence.

As it deteriorated, an investigation on the American Wall was made by independent experts in 2008 who advised the National Trust that, unless suitable repairs were carried out, it was very likely to breach in the short term, even without any tidal surge. Regrettably this advice was ignored. The situation was then made worse when the wall top and sides were damaged by National Trust vehicles using the wall as a roadway. The present flooding is the result.

Apart from the difficulty of using the Cobra Mist site, there are other repercussions which could well concern everyone in the village. As a result of the flooding and no maintenance, there is a stretch of approximately one and a half miles of the river wall on the other side of the river which is now being undermined by a very substantial body of water (approximately 600 acres) on the Ness which shouldn't be there. If the wall fails it could make Orford itself much more vulnerable to serious long term flooding.

A second issue is the damage that is being done to the river banks as a result of the increased amount of water coming in and out of the estuary every day to fill the unseen Cobra Mist site. Apart from creating additional scouring of the walls, readers may have noticed that the speed of the tide has increased near the quay. This is the main reason. Finally, apart from the loss of natural habitat caused by the flooding, there is a concern that quantities of creosote are now leaching into the Lantern Marshes and then the estuary from nearly a quarter of a million impregnated railway sleepers that make up the roadways around the Cobra Mist site. They are starting to emerge in quantities from the aerial site as a result of being submerged. Creosote is toxic to humans and wildlife.

Obviously Cobra Mist Limited is trying to do its bit, but any help that readers can give to persuade the National Trust to behave in the interests of Orford and its wider community would be much appreciated.

So that everyone can see for themselves the damage that has been created by the flooding, readers are encouraged to walk down from the Martello tower to see the breach and the extensive flooding that has occurred. You will also see how vulnerable the whole estuary now is to a possible breach from the sea. Please keep to the main track which Cobra Mist has a right of way over. Permission is not required from the National Trust.

On the plus side, readers may be interested to know that the company is in discussion with a broadband operator which is keen to use the Cobra Mist site to provide very high speed broadband (maybe up to 100Mb) to areas around and beyond Orford which currently suffer a dire service. There is also the possibility of another operator using one of the high masts to provide a significantly improved mobile service to the area.

The Bookstall Team SUDBOURNE ART GROUP

We would like to invite you to join the Sudbourne Art Group this autumn if you have an interest in art. We are a small friendly group of amateur artists who have got together to support and learn from each other. We work with a wide range of subjects and mediums from pastel landscapes, oil portraits, animal pencil drawings and watercolour still life, so there is usually someone who will try their best to help with any questions on techniques or materials if you are a beginner or want to try something new.

You are free to concentrate on your own work, but we also try to vary what we do to go beyond our comfort zones. Once a month we model for each other (fully clothed, I hasten to add) to sharpen our figure drawing skills, and also once a month, draw or paint a still life together. We have had over the past year a session painting outdoors, sessions on palette knife painting and monoprinting, two sessions on painting portraits in oil, others on how to tackle a still life, perspective and colour. We have had a mixed media workshop by Suffolk artist Dawn Pretty, and hope to be able to hire a professional model to draw and paint from in the future. Thanks to the £3 paid by members each week, we have built up a good selection of books to borrow, basic materials for enable people to experiment with unfamiliar media, and mountboard and cutter to set off our work.

Once again several members did very well at the 2015 Orford Flower Show in the art categories, and we are considering mounting an art exhibition of our own next year. With all this and coffee and biscuits too, we hope you will consider joining us!

We meet every Tuesday from 10.00am to 12noon at the Sudbourne Village Hall. There is ample parking.
