The Parish Council met the Regional Director of the National Trust recently and discussed the issues and concerns that had been raised by residents. It was agreed that in future the National Trust would provide more communication with the village in the spirit of their 'Life is Local' policy which says: '...we want our properties - built or natural - to be at the centre of life in today's communities, to help grow a sense of belonging, and encourage local pride and identity.' Meanwhile they are supporting the plans to delay the loss of the lighthouse and the preservation of its artefacts.

# NEW ORFORD TOWN TRUST BOFFINS MEMORIAL

The late Paddy Heazell researched the history of the Ness (Island) from 1913 when the MOD purchased the site. He then wrote a book entitled Most Secret. In the book he describes the many varied activities that took place over 70 or more years involving Orford residents, scientific, service and civilian personnel.

He promoted the idea of a Boffins Memorial (rather on the lines of Bletchley Park) as recognition of their work which assisted the 1914-18 and 1939-45 war effort as well as benefiting civilian life.

The lottery funded initiative "Touching the Tide" took this idea up and after commissioning suggestions from local artists and sculptors, consulted the NOTT on design and location. The Trust has agreed to a Pebble design with



### **WILLIAM HARVEY**

There are some people who say that in order to be fulfilled in life, you have to see the world, achieve great things in business and amass a fortune in status symbols

Will Harvey's life shows us that that is a complete lie!



In one sense, Will lived a completely unremarkable life

He was born on the 4<sup>th</sup> January 1955 in the Phyllis Memorial Home in Melton and as a new-born baby, he was brought to live on Market Hill, Orford. He stayed there until he and Alison moved to Peacock's Pyghtle in Orford, in 1991. He lived there for the rest of his life.

59 years, two houses

He was educated at Orford Primary School and Butley Secondary Modern School and at the age of 16 he went to work at Friends Garage.

43 years, one work place.

And yet, no one could call Will unremarkable! For a start, during his 43 years at Friend's Garage, he must have helped thousands of the motoring population of this area. It seems to me that Friend's Garage is at the heart of Orford and Will was such a major part of Friend's garage!

But although the garage occupied a lot of his time, he still filled his life very full with all his other interests

Living so close to the river, boats and water skiing were regular pastimes in his younger years. The pictures of young people on the beach during hot summers beside a barbecue with the river and boats in the background look wonderfully idyllic.

Then there were the cars. An impressive Mk1 Capri and equally impressive orange Escort RS2000 were his pride and joy before he settled down to his Volvos

Will often told me of his days manning the Vibration Road show travelling disco. It wasn't until Alison showed me the photo albums that I got a glimpse of DJ Will in action, complete with leather trousers!

But Will's interests were far wider than the normal young man pursuits

He loved aircraft, especially the military kind, he was fascinated by buildings, especially church buildings and he travelled many miles to see them.

The "Power of the Past" festivals were a favourite event in Will's calendar, and of course there was his great love of walking and wildlife, with his regular trips up to Minsmere and early morning walks into the local woods. Owls and Deer were his particular favourites but anything that moved and caught his eye were of interest. They were often then caught by his camera as well. The Red Deer on the back of the order of Service was one of Will's snaps, I think seen in Chillesford Wood

You see, Photography was another great interest of Will's. It seems as though he was rarely parted from his camera and as a result, Alison now has a remarkable collection of albums full of churches, traction engines, animals, planes, as well as family, local events and some particularly spectacular pictures of extreme weather. Will was out and busy with his camera after the October hurricane and there are also some pretty impressive pictures of 7ft snow drifts on the road out

of Orford. As someone who is relatively new to this area Will's photograph albums were absolutely fascinating to me.

Will was a man who was truly interested in so many things around him. I can't believe he was ever bored.

He was also interested in things and events that weren't so close. He was an avid reader, both of books and magazines, cutting out countless articles for his scrap books, things that had caught his attention and grabbed his interest.

Although there were many parts of the world that he had not seen, his breadth of knowledge was staggering and that coupled with his natural wisdom meant he could converse knowledgeably with most people about most things. His observations on life were often very perceptive and always worth listening to. He was something of a philosopher with a very clear understanding of the world around him.

Will may not have scaled the heights of big business, or travelled the world, living in many countries, but he was always such an interesting and stimulating man to be with because he was so interested and stimulated by the world around him. These were qualities that stayed with Will right to the end

Having said all that, there was something that struck many people more than his natural wisdom and breadth of knowledge. And that was his sense of humour.

Over the past week or so, many people have described it to me as "dry", several as "lovely" and one "quirky".

He was usually understated, but you rarely spent long with Will without him giving you something to smile or laugh about.

His humour was a gift and he used it to very good effect, not to drag people down. Whether it was in welcoming people into church here, giving me more bad news about my cars, or just brightening up the world for just about everybody he spent time with, his humour was always welcome.

During his last few days in hospital, his sense of humour didn't desert him.

But if there was something that struck me more about Will, especially in the last few months, it was his obvious love for and devotion to Alison, Simon and Lorna. His pride in them and gratitude for them.

Will was a man who was blessed in many ways, he had so many interests and attributes. But there was no question as to where his priorities lay, what gave him most pleasure.

He seemed to me to have grasped the secret of happiness in this world. He loved discovering the world around him, but appeared deeply content and thankful for what he had been given.

All of these things combined made Will an absolutely brilliant person to know

The last thing I want to mention was his calmness and confidence as he faced death. There was no ranting, no self pity. Just the firm assurance that God knew what he was doing and Will was trusting him.

The hymns that he chose, speak volumes! "What a friend we have in Jesus" "Behold the man upon his cross, my sin upon his shoulders" Read them again when you get home. As Will faced death, his eyes were on Jesus

### **LIGHTHOUSE NEWS**

Some good news. After a lengthy battle, the National Trust finally agreed to withdraw their opposition to any form of sea defences to the lighthouse which has had a miserable time with the winter storms taking up to 4 metres in a night. The beach head got to within 7 metres of the base of the main building.



works Emergency necessary and with a lull in the weather some temporary stabilisation defences have now been put in place. These were devised by Andrew Hawes, the geo-technical engineer from Aldeburgh. A digger and driver were very generously lent by Robert Orford who is restoring Saham Cottage on Quay Street. Babcocks provided their landing craft to get the heavy

equipment and materials over and Olly Page took everyone to and fro on his fishing boat. The hard labour was provided by a valiant team from Orford and around. These included Peter Benstead, John Oakes, Mark Thacker, Jason Milne, Damion Bailey as well as Olly Page. It was quite a task bagging up the gravel from the beach into large builders' bags and then wrapping and heat



welding them all into a long geotextile roll at the top of the beach. But by the end of a week, the work was done and everyone was knackered! Congratulations and thanks to everyone involved. Fingers crossed these efforts survive long enough to allow recovery of the key features and enable all who want to visit to do so.

Finally, solar powered lights have now been fitted on the top so that the lighthouse can once again be seen at night from both Orford and as far as Thorpeness.

### **NATIONAL TRUST**

Last year marked the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the National Trust's acquisition of Orford Ness from the Ministry of Defence in 1993. We were very pleased to be invited to contribute to this issue of Village Voice, to provide this update about our activities on the Ness.

Orford Ness is a vitally important landscape, notable for its natural significance and historic buildings. The Trust manages places for the long term, which means thinking about any decisions we may make today in terms of the impacts for years or even centuries to come.

As many people will be aware, there has also been considerable erosion in front of the lighthouse recently and we are working with the newly formed Orford Ness Lighthouse Company to help plan the next steps. The Company assumed ownership of the Lighthouse in September 2013, following its purchase of the building from Trinity House.

All of us at the Trust share the sadness of local people about the likely loss of the Lighthouse from the Orford Ness horizon. However, for the last 20 years the rate and speed of erosion at this part of the coastline has been very rapid. The storms and flooding many parts of the country have been experiencing since December have demonstrated that it is just not possible to defend all of our coastlines from the destructive power of nature when unleashed. The National Trust has a policy of adapting to and working with natural processes where possible. Sad as it is, we believe that the only realistic option for this historic and well-loved building is to allow natural processes to run their course.

That said, we are supporting the efforts of the Orford Ness Lighthouse Company to continue with the plans developed by Trinity House to ensure that the historic features and fittings in the lighthouse can be saved before they are lost forever. We are not opposed to the planning application for time limited, temporary, 'soft defences' of shingle filled bags which may help buy enough time for the historically important artefacts to be removed. We understand that the bags will be removed once the work to remove the artefacts is completed or if there is evidence of damage to the wider Ness as a result of the temporary defences.

The day after the storm surge event on 6<sup>th</sup> December 2013, a breach occurred in the American Wall in Lower

Lantern Marsh. We have been working with Natural England, the Environment Agency and Babcock Group to gather information about the extent of the breach and develop a Scope of Works. This includes topographical surveys, condition assessment and the development of outline proposals and cost estimates. The breach is a complex and technically difficult issue and with our partners we are thinking hard about next steps, as some of the options could potentially have impacts on the estuary as a whole.

I hope this update has been helpful. I know that there is a desire locally for people to feel better informed about the Trust's work. For that reason, in addition to our annual community day the Trust will be hosting two public drop-in meetings each year to share updates about the Ness at which anyone locally will have the opportunity to ask questions and find out more about our work on the Ness.
